Both didactic and interactive, it will address the core competencies as outlined by ACSCOT, focusing on an all-hazards approach for the acute care provider, concentrating on general principles. Major topics to be addressed include planning, triage, incident command, injury patterns, pathophysiology and special population considerations. Small-group discussions will be based on illustrative scenarios. The course will require a pre/post test that will be reviewed on-site. Intubation is a difficult skill to master and retain. In today's challenging environment the paramedic may have few, if any, opportunities to learn more about performing this critical task each year. Using a combination of academics and intensive practice sessions, this course will help refine techniques and approaches to good airway control.
